

Bourbon School Board Explains Education Options

Bourbon County Schools will offer in-person instruction starting on Sept. 28 after starting the school year with online learning due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

The district's board of education voted to endorse a plan that offers students three options for learning during its monthly meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 21.

Option A, which is the in-person choice, requires that all students and staff wear a mask at all times except during meals. Supplies are not allowed to be shared. No visitors or volunteers will be allowed in the school building for the foreseeable future, and field trips will not be permitted.

Elementary and middle school students will not rotate classes this year, and instead, teachers will switch in and out of classrooms.

High school students will be assigned a hub to do all their work from and will be seated six-feet apart from one another.

Any student who has to quarantine or are out sick will be allowed to use the online learning option.

Students with specialized learning plans will be allowed to leave the classroom for those services.

Option B is distance learning. Students enrolled in this option are expected to participate in class through online platforms Zoom or Google Classrooms. Lessons will be recorded for absent students.

Option C is only available for high school and middle school

students. Those enrolled in this option will do self-guided learning through APEX, an online learning platform, from home throughout the year, but their progress will be monitored by district staff.

Each school has plans for how the day will look and how they will keep students safe.

Each school will have multiple entry and exit points to ensure social distancing. Dismissal will be staggered to avoid crowding around the buses and car pickup lines. Staff will conduct temperature checks as students enter the building at the start of each day.

At lunch, meals will be delivered to the classroom, or students will be spread out in different locations to eat. Playground and bathroom times will be scheduled, and cleaning will take place after each round.

Students at the high school and middle school will be in the same group of students all day for potential tracking purposes.

There will be quarantine rooms at each school, and school nurses will deliver medication to students who require it during the day.

The other school district in Bourbon County, Paris Independent Schools, will also resume in-person instruction on Sept. 28.

His performances are altered somewhat depending on the environment. For instance, Josh's school visits will be age appropriate and be geared toward educating and inspiring youth. If you want to offer a program at your festival or event that will be educational, unique and just plain fun, then Josh's solo performances are a sure fire hit.

7:00 p.m. stories and music by Josh Goforth

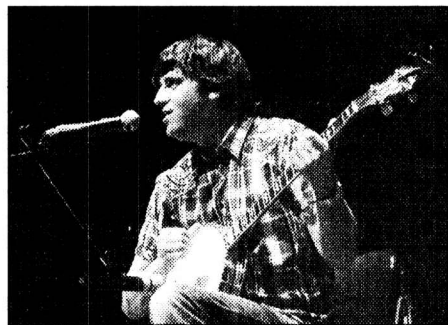

FALL CLEAN-UP MONTH FOR CITY RESIDENTS

The City of Paris has designated the month of October as FALL CLEAN-UP MONTH FOR CITY OF PARIS RESIDENTS. Brush & Limbs will be picked up curbside for one (1) week only, beginning on October 26th through October 30th, 2020 (see below schedule for pick-up day). This applies to brush and small limbs only. Other wood materials, large branches, and tree trunks/center-cuts will not be picked up. We ask that limbs/brush to be stacked with large end of the pile facing toward the street.

Heavy Trash will be picked up curbside for one (1) day only, beginning on October 22nd by Rumpke. Any questions or issues regarding heavy trash will need to be addressed directly with Rumpke by calling 1-800-828-8171.

City residents who wish to haul their own items to the City Compactor on Stewart Street may do so at no charge starting on Thursday, October 1st through Friday, October 30th, 2020. Additionally, the Compactor will be open on Saturdays from 8:00AM until 12:00 Noon. This offer does not apply to any contractors, commercial accounts or non-City residents and proof of residence will be required. Shingles and construction materials will not be accepted.

Because of Federal and State regulations, the City cannot pick up tires, car batteries, liquid paint, and hazardous materials. For information concerning their disposal, please call the State Natural Resources Environmental Protection Cabinet at (502) 564-6716.
