May 2 and Kentucky Derby Day, this year on May 3, Thurby has garnered a reputation as a more affordable way to experience the pageantry of the week without the hefty price tag. Fan can still purchased reserved seating for Thurby in the clubhouse boxes for less than \$200, whereas that same seat would likely cost upward of \$1,000 on Kentucky Derby Day.

Drew Servis, of New Jersey, is visiting a friend in Louisville for the 2025 Derby Week. The 25-year-old will be at Churchill Downs for both Thurby and the 151st Run for the Roses. He said he's looking forward to placing bets on the races, which is "the whole beauty of being here" with several races a day, and shared his picks for May 3.

"I'm no horse expert but I think I'm going to bet Rodriguez and Sovereignty, as well," Servis said.

Spectators flooded through the gates the morning of May 1, cautious of possible scattered showers but excited to be in the mix at Churchill Downs. Weather conditions for Thurby followed scattered rain on 502'sDay, a beautiful spring day on Wednesday and forecasted showers and thunderstorms throughout the remainder of Derby Week, according the National Weather Service. Kentucky Oaks has a 70% chance of rain, followed by a 40-60% chance of rain for the running of the Kentucky Derby on May 3.

The NWS says that of 150 Kentucky Derby Days, 72, or 48%, have experienced rain at some point during the day. Similarly, out of 150 Kentucky Oaks, 79, or 53% have had rainy conditions.

Wrapped in clear plastic ponchos, a group of friends and family in shades of purple made their way to the grandstand, but not before being greeted at the paddock with a late-morning shower.

Still, the weather wasn't spoiling their chase for race day winnings on Thurby, which has become a tradition over the last five years.

"I'm excited to see the people, too," said Marcy Jennings, of Louisville. "Seeing the different hats, the fashion, the dresses."

They soon shed their clear coverings and took their seats — coveted covered

They often travel back for Derby Week with friends and family members and started attending races earlier in the week to avoid the high costs of the Kentucky Oaks and Kentucky Derby.

Farrell said she doesn't attend every year but loves the atmosphere and energy at the track.


