Trip's goal is to build relationships with universities

Peter Thomas, assistant vice president for global services and senior international officer for Campbellsville University, is visiting universities in India as part of an eightday tour.

CU reports that Thomas will make the visits to build relationships and partnerships with universities across the South Asian country. During these visits, he will hold meetings with the university's administration and interact with students.

He will begin his tour with a visit to KL University in Hyderabad.
