

Cobb nominated for Hall of Fame

Randall Cobb made the ballot for the College Football Hall of Fame.

The former Kentucky all-purpose wide receiver, quarterback and punt returner will be up for consideration in the Class of 2026.

Cobb is one of 79 players and nine coaches from the Football Bowl Subdivision and 100 players and 35 coaches named to the ballot from the divisional ranks.

“For more than 65 years, the NFF College Football Hall of Fame has stood as the sport’s ultimate archive, honoring those whose impact on the game still echoes today,” said NFF President & CEO Steve Hatchell. “This year’s ballot carries forward that responsibility, spotlighting individuals who not only excelled on the field but also helped define what college football means to so many.”

Cobb was a first-team All-American as an all-purpose player and finalist for the Paul Hornung Award as the nation’s most versatile player in 2010. He’s the only FBS player to rank first or second on a team in rushing, passing and receiving during 2010

season. The two-time, first-team, All-SEC performer holds the conference record for single-season all-purpose yards with 2,396, set in 2010, and set the UK mark for career touchdowns with 37.

Former Eastern Kentucky running back Markus Thomas also was named to the ballot.

Thomas finished his career ranked third all-time in FCS history in rushing with 5,149 yards and was a two-time Ohio Valley Conference Offensive Player of the Year. He led the Colonels to two Ohio Valley Conference titles. He finished with 52 career rushing touchdowns.

Former Louisville defensive end Elvis Dumervil is also on the ballot. He was a unanimous first-team All-American and winner of the Nagurski Trophy after leading the nation in sacks (20) and ranking fourth in tackles for a loss with 22 in 2005. He was Big East Defensive Player of the Year and set the NCAA mark for sacks in a game with six against Kentucky in 2005. He was the Ted Hendricks Award winner and Bill Willis Trophy recipient in 2005. He led the Cardinals to a conference title, an 11-1 record, and a No. 6 final ranking in 2004,

Preservationists display military vehicles in Louisville this weekend

KSP investigates shooting involving off-duty officer

JEFFERSONTOWN—Kentucky State Police are investigating an officer-involved shooting in Jefferson County involving an off-duty Jeffersontown police officer which led to the death of a man who allegedly was creating a disturbance.

The KSP’s Critical Incident Response Team was requested by the Jeffersontown Police Department to investigate an officer-involved shooting that occurred May 27 on Robson Road in Jeffersontown.

At this point, the preliminary investigation indicates that JPD received multiple 911 calls from neighbors and individuals in the 9000 block of Robson Road, reporting that an individual, later identified as Marco Dorsey, was in the area making threatening statements and causing property damage to multiple vehicles and residences. It also was reported that Dorsey was involved in a verbal argument with a roommate, reportedly had consumed alcohol and left his residence.

An off-duty JPD officer became aware of the dis-

turbance involving Dorsey and attempted to speak with him. During the interaction, the JPD officer discharged his agency-issued firearm, striking Dorsey, who died from his injuries.

The JPD officer was uninjured and no other injuries were reported.

Since the JPD officer was off duty, he did not have his body camera, so no video is available. Investigators are looking into nearby residents who have doorbell cameras as well as businesses in the area, to see if any of them may have recorded the incident on surveillance cameras.

The KSP has statewide jurisdiction and investigates officer-involved shootings throughout the state as requested by local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. KSP is committed to being transparent while ensuring the integrity of the investigation.

To protect the integrity of an ongoing investigation, it is KSP’s standard operating procedure not to release specific details until vital witnesses have been interviewed and pertinent facts have been gathered.

This year, a total of 21 communities across Kentucky also are participating in the fun with special events for anglers, especially the youngsters in the crowd. Click on the Free Fishing Weekend webpage or go online to fw.ky.gov to search for a list of events.

Resources are available on the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife

Resources’ website at fw.ky.gov to help get you started:

- Get the basics: Search “Learn to Fish” for instructional videos covering knot tying and how to fillet fish.
- Get equipped: Look up loaner poles for locations of free loaner fishing pole locations.
- Learn the rules: See the annual Kentucky Fishing & Boating Guide.
- Where to go: Visit the Fishing in Neighborhoods page for lists of easily accessible, specially stocked lakes.
- Get inside information: Peruse the fishing forecast for intel on fish around the state.
- Find the fish: Search

fish attractors for habitat maps at various lakes – you can even download GPX files from there.

There’s an app anglers can use to find directions to local lakes, read fishing reports, learn about regulations, find stocking schedules, locate the nearest boat ramp and more. To download the app, search for “Fish Boat KY” in your preferred app store.

The weekend pass doesn’t entitle you to hop your neighbor’s fence and access their pond. You always need permission to fish private waters. It’s also not an excuse to ignore daily limits, size limits or other regulations.

It does mean that anyone fishing in Kentucky doesn’t need a license or permit.
