Timely Tips For Disease Prevention In Vegetable Gardens

Warmer temperatures have gardeners eager to start planting. However, before diving into the gardening season, it's crucial to develop a plan for this year's vegetable garden. Proper planning can significantly reduce disease pressure and enhance the overall success of your crops. Here are some key considerations for getting ahead of diseases in your vegetable garden.

Selecting an optimal site for your vegetable garden is the first step in disease prevention. The best sites are sunny, have adequate moisture, and fertile, welldrained soil. Avoid low spots that can worsen soilborne diseases and shady areas that can increase foliar diseases. Drawing a planting map before planting can help you consider site limitations and plan for succession planting. Taller crops like sweet corn or tomatoes should be planted on the north or west side of the garden to prevent shading shorter plants. Retain these maps for future reference to aid in planning subsequent seasons.


Crop rotation is a vital strategy for preventing disease-causing pathogens from building up in the soil. If you use the same garden site each year, avoid planting the same or closely related crops in the same location annually. A three-year rotation is recommended, but even a year or two out of a particular plant family can be beneficial. Closely related crops, such as tomatoes, peppers, potatoes, and eggplants, share similar disease issues. Rotating these crops can help mitigate disease risks.

Home composting can be beneficial if it is done correctly. Avoid diseased composting plants or produce, as home compost piles typically do not reach temperatures high enough to kill pathogens. Turn compost piles at least once per month to accelerate decomposition. Ensure that finished compost piles are not contaminated with fresh material, which won't break down in time for spring planting. Adding water to dry compost piles during turning can facilitate more complete decomposition.

gardening Each season offers valuable lessons. Keeping detailed records of disease and pest issues, cultivar performance, and weather patterns can help develop strategies for future prevention and management. Whether using an app or a physical garden journal, tracking these details can provide insights that improve your gardening practices year after year.

Anyone who has not submitted a change of address for 2024 Tax Bills or has a PO Box not listed on their 2023 Tax Bills would need to report this Address Correction.

Homestead / Disability Exemption

Any person who turned 65 years of age in 2024 or will be 65 years of age in 2024 that has title to, lives in, and maintains their personal residence would need to stop by the Property Valuation Office or call to sign up for their Homestead Exemption. This Exemption is also available to anyone who is 100% Disabled and receiving payments from a Disability Administrator. Tangible Property
