The signs indicate a space is reserved for those who have served and those who continue to serve. Adrian Bambini who spearheads the sign effort in this area, spends countless hours visiting businesses, city and county government agencies selling the signs and in most cases installing them. The county clerk's fee was amended to increase by \$39,753, and the county budget was amended to increase by \$60,553 with funds from LGEA, a state grant, the jail and roads.

Sebree Man Arrested By KSP Officers

A 32-vear old Sebree man was arrested Tuesday, April 22, by the Kentucky State Police on charges related to child sexual abuse material.

According to a KSP report, Joseph Lee Kellems was arrested following an undercover Internet Crimes Against Children investigation. The investigation began after it was discovered the suspect was allegedly procuring a minor online.

The report states that the investigation led to an interview in Morganfield on April 22, and equipment used to facilitate the crime was seized and taken to the KSP forensic laboratory for examination.

Kellems was arrested just afternoon on Tuesday and charged with two counts of promoting/procuring used of a minor by electronic means, Class C felonies punishable by five to ten years in prison. Kellems is lodged in the Webster County Jail. He is being held on a \$10,000 cash bond, according to jail records. There was no information available on when Kel-

lems will make his first court appear-

The investigation of Kellems activities is ongoing.

The Kentucky internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force is comprised of more than twenty-six local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The mission of the ICAC Task Force, created by the United States Department of Justice and administered by the Kentucky State Police is to assist state and local law enforcement agencies in developing a response to cyber enticement and child sexual abuse material investigations. This support encompasses forensic and investigative components training and technical assistance, victim services, prevention and community education. The ICAC program was developed in response to the increasing number of children and teenagers using the internet, the proliferation of child sexual abuse material, and the heightened online activity or predators searching for unsupervised contact with underage victims.

Inspection Period For The Property Assessment Roll

The Webster County Property Assessment roll will be open from Monday, May 6, 2024 through Saturday, May 11, 2024 and from Monday, May 13, 2024 through Saturday, May 18, 2024 and also on Monday, May 20, 2024 for the 2024 Tax Year. Under the Supervision of the P.V.A. or one of the Deputies, any person may inspect the assessment roll.

This is the January 1, 2024 assessment on which the state, county, school, and other districts taxes for 2024 will be due this fall.

Any property owner desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the P.V.A. must first request a conference with the P.V.A. We can conference by Telephone, Email, or in Person. To avoid waiting you may want to call ahead and reserve a time. Those individuals who are unable to come in can appeal by writing a letter identifying the property and stating the reason for appeal and the Taxpayer's opinion of value.

Any property owner still aggrieved by an assessment of real property, after a conference with the P.V.A. can file an appeal on Wednesday, May 21, 2024 with the Webster County Clerk's Office by writing a letter identifying the property and stating the reason for appeal and the Taxpayer's opinion of value to be reviewed by Webster County Board of Assessment

Any property owner failing to appeal to the County Board of Appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by a designated representative will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky **Board of Assessment Appeals.**

Appeals for personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property owners shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provision of KRS 131.100.

The following steps should be taken when a property owner does not agree with the assessed value of personal property;

- 1) Property owner must list under protest (for certification) what they believe to be the fair cash value of the property.
- 2) Property owner must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of
- 3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- 4) The final decision of the Kentucky Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

(The Webster County PVA Office is responsible for the assessment of property, however, we do not set tax rates or collect taxes.)
