FPB cable customers may see 5% hike from network passthrough fees

Frankfort Plant Board cable customers may notice a rise in network pass-through fees on their bills starting in July. The proposed hikes are a direct result of increased programming costs of the channels on FPB cable.

During its May board meeting, FPB held a public hearing about increasing the rate of the cable network pass-through fee, as well as the rate for Bulk Cable I and Bulk Cable II.
